REFLECTIONS FROM RON

Dear Friends and Colleagues,

It's about this time of year that we ask, "Where did the last year go?" It's also the time that we begin to implement our plan for the year that's upon us. Now, if you're asking, "What plan?", then you're probably like thousands, maybe millions of others who realized that the end of one year and the start of a new year were rushing headlong towards each other without realizing that we were the ones lying bound hand and foot on the tracks between the two. Before those two trains collide, we need a plan to implement — something to get us out of the way of the collision. But as is usually the case, many of us will begin the New Year the same as we ended the last one — without a plan. And the result is we have no way of knowing whether we've grown appreciably from the last year (or at least done those things which would

have cultivated growth). And on the other side, without a plan to implement for the New Year we have no way to determine our means of growth for the year that's coming.

The blessing in this New Year is that it is new. And the newness of everything is ripe with opportunities and yet to be realized challenges. It is at the same time new enough to allow some thoughtful, provocative, and creative excursions into how God might be working to reveal Christ's presence in our world. We might still be pushed in a different direction by life, but only as life seeks to distract us from where we might be headed by design. And when those distract-

tions arise, it's much easier to find your way back if there was a way charted, a plan laid out, or a given destination to which we were headed.

So, as we give ourselves over to the newness of the year, along with the newness of possibility, the newness of opportunities, the newness of challenges, and the newness of an adventure with God, let's also give ourselves over to the newness of a year with a plan to cultivate Christian growth. If there is not yet a plan in place, then let's give ourselves over to designing one that will lead to our own growth and perhaps the growth of others. Let's remember that the day and the year are new, and resolve to approach this New Year with at least this plan:

55 cents per mile for business miles driven.

24 cents per mile driven for medical or moving purposes.

14 cents per mile driven in service of charitable organizations.

WE ARE CALLED TO EMBODY GOD'S LOVE

It was the poet Edgar Guest who wrote, "I'd rather see a sermon than hear one any day." His point, while mistakenly undervaluing preaching, has some real significance.

This month we celebrate Christmas, and I will hear sermons preached—and preach a few myself—that talk about the meaning of this important holiday. Many of us will tell congregations that Christmas is a celebration of God's gift of love to all humanity.

God cared enough to send the very best—God's own self, the second person of the trinity, the eternal Son of God, to be born as a baby in Bethlehem of Judea. As the Nicene Creed puts it, "For us and for our salvation he became incarnate of the Virgin Mary."

"Incarnate" means in-fleshment. The God who is eternally spirit took on human flesh to live as one of us. The eternal Christ became Jesus of Nazareth, who lived, taught, died and rose again for the salvation of the world.

As John 3:16 puts it, "For God so loved the world, that he gave his only son, that whoever believes in him should not perish but have eternal life."

Sermons that carry that basic gospel message are crucial because they teach people the ultimate truth of the universe. There is a God, this God loves the world, and God became human in Jesus, who is the savior of the world. Getting that message across is important in the process of any individual coming to faith in Christ and setting out on the path of Christian discipleship.

Yet I also know Guest's point about "seeing a sermon." As important as words are, there are times when I know they are cheap. Some words are easily spoken as if the speaking were all that was needed. That is never true. Speaking the word, even the word of God, is preliminary to action—acting out the word of God.

We are called to embody the love of Christ for the world.

The life of Christian discipleship is a life of action. We are called to love our families well—and sometimes that is not easy. We are called to share our resources with the poor—and finding the most effective way to share is often difficult. We are called to verbally share our faith with those outside the church—and faith sharing is scary. We are called to give of our talents to make the church stronger and more missionally effective—and time is often what is most precious to us.

I believe the love of God is transforming the world and that God uses us to embody his love.

I hope the Christmas season makes a difference in your life. I hope your faith, your hope and your love for God and your neighbor is stronger at the end of this month.

How are you going to embody that faith, hope and love so that the world is transformed?
