
With my Catholic background I called her my Mother Superior rather than mother-in-law. She died several years ago and I still miss her guidance and support.



Rev Don Flanner serves Mapleton UMC

My mother, Alice Flanner was a dedicated Christian who attended West Liberty UMC where she met my father, Raymond Flanner in 1937, when they were both 19 years old.

Dad moved to the West Liberty area that year on a dairy farm about 1 1/2 miles from the church and began attending that Methodist Church.

Dad entered the US Army in 1940 and they corresponded dated until they married in December 1941. My oldest brother was born in 1943 and my sister in 1944. Dad served as a decorated officer in WW11, and returned home in Nov 1944.



Dad had experienced a "call to ministry" while serving in Europe, but wrestled with that call. When mom was pregnant in Jan 1946 and expected me in late October, I was born several days early, on my father's birthday, Oct 21st.

At the hospital in Ft Scott, mom said to dad, "Ray you do not have to be a minister to serve in ministry, you can train up a child in the way God desires. Maybe Don will be a minister someday." Her words were prophetic and she and dad were active in West Liberty Methodist church all of their lives.

They raised 8 children on that farm and mom read the Bible stories to us each night and taught us prayers at home and in VBC and church. Mom taught a "Willing Worker's Sunday School class" for 60 years at West Liberty and set an example for us. Mom also had a son, my younger brother, 19 months after me, and she propheticly told my dad that he may be a minister someday as well. He became an ordained minister too.

Dad lived 92 years and mom lived to within 3 weeks of being 95 and both attended church until their health impaired them during their last year of life.

All 8 children, 4 boys and 4 girls have been active in Christian ministry and churches all of our lives. My oldest brother, a medical Dr, went on medical mission trips to Haiti 16 times in the last 18 years, prior to his retirement in 2013. My older sister is now the UMW Tennessee State Representative and has been serving as organist and youth leader in the Clarksville UMC in Tennessee for 22 years.

My dad and mom wrote letters to all of us and my dad reminded my brother and me, that he was in prayer for us every day while we served in ministry. Mother never forgot birthday's of all her family/ extended family and most of the church family and friends. She checked who was absent at church every Sunday, for many years, and mailed bulletins and prayer requests made at church each Sunday to all who were absent.

I have attached a photo of mom and me in 2011, while she still lived at home until her last 2 weeks of life. A life well lived
