United Methodist Church Polity: By Marvé Ralston

UMC polity can make for stimulating conversation. Almost as exciting, as figuring out the meaning behind the many acronyms, United Methodists use.

However, there are some very important pieces of UMC Polity, that we all need to understand. This is especially true this time of year, when the *itineracy* of the UMC is at work, through the Bishop and Cabinet appointment process.

Itineracy began with John Wesley in England. It carried over to the United States with Francis Asbury. Itineracy was part of the "connexion" that John Wesley created and worked diligently to promote.

Preachers itinerated very often in early Methodism. As frequently as every 2 months, and their limit to staying in one place was two years. John Wesley looked at itineracy as a strong commitment from the pastors. They showed strength of commitment by their willingness to move.

"This process is currently directed by Bishops, implemented by District Superintendents and allows for exchange of pastoral leadership and resources across the conference and sometimes conferences." (Warner, "The Method of our Mission").

The process of appointment making is more complex than it looks. By the time an introductory is eminent, many things have been reviewed. This process actually begins after the Appointive Recommendation forms are returned in December. The forms are given to both clergy and the local church Pastor Parish Relations (PPR) committee to fill out. Both are asked if this clergy and church are a good fit moving into the new year. Even if they currently are in a good fitting situation, sometimes their gifts and talents are needed elsewhere. The move can be initiated by the clergy person, the PPR committee, the District Superintendent, or the Bishop.

If a new appointment is going to happen, then many things are considered. First the location of the appointment, is it rural or urban, will it require the clergy person to move. Then the profile of the clergy person. This is created, with input from the clergy person themselves, the District Superintendent, Pastor Parish Relations (PPR) committee, if they previously were in an appointment, any needed information from the District Board of Ordained Ministry, and other pertinent information that can help with the process. This is all looked at by the Bishop and Cabinet (made up from all the district superintendents in the conference) as they work on appointing pastors to our local churches. Much prayer goes into the process before a move is considered.

After the decision is made, the next step is the pay worksheet that is signed by the PPR chair, the clergy person and the District Superintendent at the introductory.

All of this happens before the announcement about the new clergy person. The clergy are appointed by Bishop Saenz, during Annual Conference, for the new appointive season, which runs from July 1st to June 30th. They typically move the Sunday, before the first Sunday in July, and the first Sunday in July, is the first time they fill their new pulpit.

Some of our smaller churches are led by District Superintendent Assignments (DSA) and Certified Lay Ministers (CLM) who are folks that have taken specific classes to lead small congregations and been approved by the District Committee on Ministry.
