But courage is not in a heroic voice raising a banner, shouting "follow me!" The quiet courage in an anxious time comes from the leader who more simply keeps an eye on the purpose and who quietly says to those about, "keep moving."

How are you practicing "quiet courage in an anxious time"? It's not easy. But it's what is needful in this season of the church.

We have a New Bishop! By Marvé Ralston

On September 22nd, the Bishop of the Great Plains, Ruben Saenz (pronounced like Signs), visited Five Rivers District.

He started the day with a tour of some of our churches in the area with the DS, then met the clergy from our district in two different breakout sessions. In the evening there was a reception held in his honor.



Bishop Saenz is moving into his 5th career. He has taught, coached, and had his own business. He served in urban Dallas, Tx, with emphasis on mentoring, reading programs, worked with gang individuals, kids that were considered "throw always," and health care.

He is trilingual. Growing up he always felt he stood apart. He had to be ok with it.

At one time he had the largest Hispanic congregation in the US.

'How does he lead? "He is a facilita-

tive leader, Democratic leader, and can be directive and authoritarian. "

"We need a signature mission as the Great Plains Conference" said Bishop Saenz. In Deuteronomy it says, teach the children and seek the welfare of the children. "Children is an emphasis handed down from Bishop Jones ministry. It is a good one. "

"Children are windows into the environment they live in. Jesus put children in the center. Children need to grow up in a situation that teaches them to trust," he said.

"We are in a time and place where it can be harder to connect to communities. Our laity can connect and know how to do that. We need to equip them to reach those most troubled areas, increase Vital Congregations, help people connect with Christ. We're in a time and place where the church has a lot to say, about a lot of things. We are the Wesleyan Christian Mission."

The churches and the conference need to find their emphasis and use "laser beam" focus to help what they are meant to work towards.

When speaking to clergy he said, "Be Christ Centered, Be Excellent. A lot of us are unsupervised. We need to find the internal fortitude to do what is needed for Christ. Be fruitful. Strive for there being more at the end of the day. Fruit is people, children for Christ. Is our ministry accountable and collaborative?" he asked.

Bishop Saenz gets up at 4:30 a.m. each morning. In the morning, he said, there is no one there and he can get things done. He has his devotion time. "Don't leave the house without doing this", he said.

"Do your job and trust that others are doing the same. Everyone is a missional strategist," is the way he ended his first session with our clergy.

Bishop Saenz requests that we pray for him as he takes over the leadership of the Great Plains.

From Fellowship to Faith to Following – Building Relationships That Lead to Discipleship By Marvé Ralston

lola Wesley and the lola UMW were the hosts of our Fab Five Fall Festival on October 1st. Our guest speaker was Rev. Dr. David Lowes Watson. Youth from Burlington UMC were hospitality greeters. This learning opportunity was a response to a survey that went out to the district in 2015 from the District Leadership Team in Five Rivers. The Leadership team tried to pull together a training event that best met the responses we received from our survey.

We began the day with lively worship lead by Mary Brooks (Lyndon UMC). After a greeting and short message by Rev. Jocelyn Tupper, Iola Wesley, Dr. David Lowes Watson began the 1st session of the day.

The first teaching was on our identity as the church. "Who Are We?"

"We need to get to the depth of our calling and reaffirm it," encouraged Dr. Watson.



He went on to say, "We tend to shape the church by the standards of society/popular response. We need to be prepared to look ridiculous if that is what the Lord requests."

"We are called to be a blessing to the world and not a gatekeeper, "he later noted.

"We should become known for telling folks they are doing what God loves, even if they aren't Christians." He emphasized.

"Yes, we are born again, but how does that make a difference in how we live?"

The second session was about "forming Christian Disciples". He talked about a small group format that nurtures discipleship as a craft." If discipleship is a craft, we cannot afford to lose it.

In the afternoon the Baker University Speech Choir gave a thought provoking talk about what millennials want to see in people of faith with excerpts from the Barna Group studies.

The first afternoon session by Dr. Watson was on "The Church in and for the World." This was about our primary calling, to announce the coming Reign of God on earth as in heaven. The church is sent to tell the world the good news that Planet Earth is being redeemed in and through Jesus Christ, who will then call others to join us in that proclamation. The flaming center of our ministry is this message, not ourselves as messengers.

We ended the day with "Sharing the Gospel." He talked about the benefits of small, more intimate groups where we hold each other accountable for spiritual growth and the benefits of mentoring new Christians. Continued from page. 6

Watson, stressed that there is "cost" to being a disciple. We often use the term disciple too loosely. The General Rules of the United Methodists are easy to understand, but difficult to do.
